One Can Cannot Go Back...

At a recent NE Minnesota Synod Rostered Leaders Conference I attended, the speaker, the Rev. Dr. Benjamin Stewart, a Pastor and Professor, spoke on the topic of: "Re-membering the Body: Healing after COVID's Crisis Phase."

A timely topic indeed – healing after COVID – a topic that could be the subject of most any a pastor's monthly newsletter since COVID first blocked our church pews in March of 2020. The summary statement of Dr. Stewart's excellent, scholarly lectures read as follows: As we rise again as church after the initial phase of COVID, how can the theological motif of healing help orient us to this moment and to the challenges of the future?

As is often the case for me when I listen to such a presentation, there are so many wonderful words to drink in from the *deep-well-of-wisdom* that I feel like I am drinking water from a firehose! But for me, the summary take-a-way with respect to "healing" after COVID is that *one cannot go back*.

As we come to worship each Sunday morning, we, like those women who first came to the empty tomb, experience the sunrise of a new day, and *one cannot go back*. Every Sunday that we gather for worship we sing and rehearse the salvation story that God is continually moving us forward, resurrecting that which has died, and ushering us forth to something new, and *one cannot go back*.

When Adam & Eve were cast from the Garden of Eden, they could not go back. After the Flood, when Noah and the rest of the created order disembarked from the ark, they could not go back. When God called Moses to tell Pharaoh: Let my people go! And lead the Children of Israel out of Egypt, through the wilderness, into the freedom of the Promised Land, they could not go back.

And on, and on, the salvation ("healing") narrative goes. The Children of Israel were carted off into exile by Babylon's Nebuchadnezzar, and the glory which was once David's Kingdom was destroyed, they could not go back. And when the Persian King, Cyrus the Great, liberated the Children of Israel so that a remnant could return, it was assumed that the glory of David's Kingdom would return with them, but they could not go back. And when the Prophets, who pointed to the coming of the Christ who would die on a cross and rise three days hence, would redeem not just Israel but the whole world, they could not go back.

My point, and I do have one, is this: as we navigate life in a COVID/Post COVID world our cry is one of wanting to resume some type of normal, or a "new normal" (whatever that might be?), as if we can revisit what life was like before COVID and somehow return to that. And I too have been tempted to propagate such a paradigm in my preaching and writing to you folks. But it just ain't so. There are many adjectives to define the working of God's Holy Spirit, but "normal" is not one of them. We cannot go back. We can celebrate the past, we can learn from the past, we can grieve the past, we can reconcile injuries from the past, we can reconstruct bits and pieces of structures from the past, but we cannot go back to the past.

As we sit and drink coffee in the Fellowship Hall after church we can reminisce on the days when the education wing at Our Savior's was packed with children for Sunday School, and the Sunday School Superintendent came by to collect the attendance sheets and the Sunday School offering. Those are wonderful memories, but we cannot go back. BUT WHAT WE CAN DO is get a half dozen motivated mothers to covenant together to take turns on Sunday mornings collectively gathering their children, ages 2 through 8, teaching simple Bible lessons through songs, crafts, stories, and moving large muscle groups. Maybe it's not so much Sunday School as it is "play dates with Jesus?" Or how about, "Adventures with Jesus."

As we look at the hundred-year plus history of Our Savior's we are impressed with the pictures displaying large Confirmation classes with two pastors - and at one time, a youth director - flanking the sides of each picture. Dozens of kids sat quietly in their desks as parents *made their children go*, and Pastors delivered structured instruction, and the entire community coalesced around the sanctity of Wednesday night as "Church Night."

Those are wonderful memories, but we cannot go back. BUT WHAT WE CAN DO is truly listen to our youth, understand the pressures they are under, structure our Confirmation instruction to address each challenge they face, begin conversations on life and faith premised on where they live, and understand that what is going to motivate our youth to attend Confirmation might not necessarily be their parents, but their peer group, and the love they can find in a Savior that truly cares.

I could go on. But as the Holy Spirit continues to guide and sustain us awaiting that final day of Christ's return, let us cling to these promises from Isaiah and the Book of Revelation...

"I am about to do a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it? I will make a way in the wilderness and rivers in the desert." Isaiah 43:19

"And the one who was seated on the throne said, "See, I am making all things new." Also he said, "Write this, for these words are trustworthy and true." Revelation 21:5

Mission Action

They came, they helped and packed almost 60 complete school kits for Lutheran World Relief on Sunday September 11th. Thank you to all who unwrapped items, bundled pencil and pens and set up kits for completing 10 bags at a time. To those who packed the notebooks into bags and all the other bag items. Someone asked why we did it in groups of ten and a response from a worker was that is how many fingers we have to help keep track of number of items needed for a group of bags! An idea of how many pens and pencils and notebooks in 60 bags is 300 each pens and pencils and 240 notebooks! We are in need of about 40-50 children's blunt scissors and 20 pencil sharpeners to finish the rest of the partially packed bags. Please no cheapie sharpeners as they just don't work.

Quilting is now Mondays from 9-12N with a coffee break and goodies. We will soon send quilts to Salvation Army as people are getting cold now and not just at Christmas. The new batting we ordered from Oklee Quilting is wonderful and has no holes or lumps like the other has had in the past. This company has a reasonable 60" wide batting specially designed for LWR quilting and each 60-yard roll gives us about 22 fillers and costs about \$125.00 including shipping.

Remember, the thread is the love that sews the seams and the ties bind us all together.
