### Money... and the Joy of Jesus

You work for money. You save money. You spend money. You tithe money (sometimes using online giving!) You stress over money.

A significant portion of your life will revolve around earning, saving, giving, and spending money. So, your relationship with money isn't something you can just brush aside as unspiritual or unnecessary... Money is a wonderful servant, just so, it is a terrible master. (Tithe.ly.com)

The above quotes were captured from one of many online stewardship resources that I will be consulting in the weeks and months ahead. These words articulate much of angst we all have over money. And as I write this February *VOICE* newsletter article to you, it is with great *concern*, *joy*, and an *open heart* that I speak to you about our financial stewardship.

First, my *concern* is that as of the close of 2022 our church operating budget is **\$9,425.70** in the red. But my *joy* is that I know of your generosity, and that WE WILL meet this present financial challenge. But there is an even greater *joy*, that which is found in knowing Jesus Christ regardless of how the financial ledger looks at the end of the month!

Any stressful situation is a reminder of how much we need to trust in Christ Jesus. As I write these words to you today, I am driven to my knees trusting that God will provide, not only for the church budget, but for all the "shortfalls" that keep us up at night.

There is no shortage of reasons as to why a financial crunch is impinging upon our church operating budget. It is as obvious as the inflation that takes a huge bite out of our grocery bill every week. Candidly, many of our "best givers" are no longer with us, and it behooves our congregation to cultivate a new generation of commitment to the mission and ministry of our church. And of course, COVID has disrupted the habit of worship attendance for which it might take a while to recover. But still, it is in this context, with an *open heart*, I ask that you look to God not only FIRST, but ONLY, and to hear these challenging, but yet comforting words from scripture:

"Do not be anxious about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus." (Philippians 4:6-7)

"Trust in the Lord with all your heart, and do not lean on your own understanding. In all your ways acknowledge him, and he will make straight your paths."

(Proverbs 3:5-6)

"Therefore, do not be anxious about tomorrow, for tomorrow will be anxious for itself. Sufficient for the day is its own trouble." (Matthew 6:34)

"Provide purses for yourselves that will not wear out, a treasure in heaven that will not be exhausted, where no thief comes near and no moth destroys. For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also." (Luke 12:33-34)

It is very difficult to articulate, as Christians WE DO NOT GIVE of our financial resources to meet a church budget (even though I have informed you of our financial short fall!). No, we give NOT to meet a budget, we give because God – in Christ Jesus – has already met and given to us.

I get it, and totally understand, that many of you who are reading this *VOICE* article give very generously to our mission and ministry at Our Savior's Lutheran Church, and we thank you for that! Moreover, as a "recovering people pleaser" it is with great fear and trepidation that I write this article to you in the first place. I can almost see some rolling their eyes and saying: "*That's all the Preacher ever does is talk about money!*"

But I would be less than responsible as your Pastor if I did not remind you that God is the greatest of Givers, and in return God has created you to Give. All of us need to be reminded – those who give a weekly offering, as well as those who have not given for quite some time – that Christian stewardship is always premised on the need of the giver to give, and not the need to meet a church budget.

For just a moment take the anxiety of a budget shortfall off the table. Regardless of whether the church budget is being met, or not, have you challenged yourself to give a proportion of your income to the church? The biblical standard is to give a tithe, 10% of your income. Obviously for many of us this is a HUGE step, particularly if you are not in the practice of budgeting for that in the first place. But if not 10% of your income, how about 5%, or 3%, or 1%? I guess the point is to start somewhere with an estimate of giving which "disciplines the disciple" to see financial giving as an act of worship.

The season of Lent is just around the corner (*Ash Wednesday, February 22*<sup>nd</sup>); and it has been a while since we have had an intentional conversation on our financial stewardship as a part of our worship. The last time that we as a congregation had an intentional stewardship drive and invited our membership to pledge (an estimate of giving for the year) was between April of 2018 and March of 2019 (*Shortly after that COVID hit shutting down many functions of our ministry*). When the Church Council reconvenes after this year's Annual Meeting (*Sunday, January 29*<sup>th</sup>) financial stewardship will be a major topic of conversation, and I propose the working title of... *Money... and the Joy of Jesus.*

# Ash Wednesday Begins the Season of Lent Wednesday, February 22nd at 6:30 p.m.

Ash Wednesday is so named because of the tradition of imposing an ash on the forehead of worshippers with the phrase – "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return." Why ashes? The Bible tells us that ashes were a symbol of:

- a) Repentance or turning away from sin (Jonah 3:6; Job 24:6; Matthew 11:21; Luke 10:13)
- b) Cleansing (Hebrews 9:13)
- c) Our human mortality (Genesis 3:19)
- d) Mourning (Isaiah 61:3)

Beginning with the ash on Ash Wednesday, the season of Lent is meant for us to take a more intentional look at our relationship with God, and how God has blessed us with the life, ministry, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. Part of the discipline of Lent is a reminder that as Christ died for us, he now asks us to live for him in the service that we render to the world.

This year, as a part of our Ash Wednesday worship experience - at the end of the service - families are encouraged to bring their dried out palm branches from last year's Palm Sunday worship and they will be symbolically burned outside; yet another means to highlight the significance of Ash Wednesday. It has also been a tradition at Our Savior's to have a simple potato bake dinner before the Ash Wednesday Service that will begin at 5:30 p.m. (See the adjoining article)

## Musical Notes

We are already looking to the second month in the New Year. I have to let the calendar regulate my life but the calendar and I are not always on friendly terms. What I mean by that is that it gets

difficult to plan things very far ahead. This is where faith comes into play. Can I expect a full choir, will all of the singers be healthy, will the weather rear its ugly head and I could go on forever with this speculation. So my disclaimer is, "barring any unforeseen events this is what will take place this February.

On February the 5<sup>th</sup>, I am pleased to share a 'new' anthem with you. It is called "Light of Christ, Burn Bright" - music by Orin Johnson and text by John T. Kyler. What is unique about this music is that it is written in 5/4 time. Why is this so different you ask? Most of the music you experience in church, whether choral or in the hymnal, is in 2, 3 or 4 beats per measure. The text flows beautifully in this time signature so the piece feels quite natural. Just don't try to dance to it! As the music develops you will discover that it is a Communion hymn.

Next, on the 12<sup>th</sup> we will feature two selections with the handbells. Because of Lenten mid-week services, we will not have practices until after Lent. So, we will go out with a bang, so to speak. Our first selection will be a Spiritual called "Give Me Jesus." We will follow that with a wonderful arrangement of "Brother James Air." This particular arrangement keeps all of the players busy and demonstrates why we have so much fun playing three octave bell selections this year.

And for the final Sunday the choir sings in February we offer "Praise the Lord, Alleluia." The music is by William Boyce in an arrangement by Douglas Wagner. I wanted to get one last 'Alleluia' in before we retire the word for Lent. This is an anthem where each voice has its turn at singing the melody. A sort of 'equal opportunity' anthem.

The choir will sing at Ash Wednesday service on February 22<sup>nd</sup>. I have not yet made my choice for that service, so, come and be surprised!
