FIFTH GRADE FIRST COMMUNION INSTRUCTION SUNDAYS MARCH 19TH, 26TH, AND APRIL 2ND 4 TO 6 P.M

As is a part of the rhythm and traditions of Our Savior's Lutheran Church, we reaffirm the practice of scheduling First Communion Instruction for our Fifth Graders, leading up to inviting fifth graders to have their First Communion experience on the Maundy Thursday Service during Holy Week. This year the Maundy Thursday Worship Service is scheduled Thursday, April 6th at 6:30 p.m.

The textbook we will all use will be Come to God's Table: Preparing for Holy Communion (Augsburg Fortress, 1989). Having a two-hour instruction session late on a Sunday afternoon (4 to 6 p.m.) can be kind of daunting on the attention span! But trust that there will be "recess type" breaks scheduled into the instruction time, as well as pizza that will be served towards the close of the instruction time.

MUSICAL NOTES

I just completed getting all my music organized through Easter. That is no small feat because between Ash Wednesday and Easter we will be preparing seven anthems! I usually like to get about four or so rehearsals in with each selection. This is always the most challenging season that a church choir director faces. It is both an exhilarating and exhausting experience. I am not looking for sympathy, but I do want you to understand the commitment that my singers have.

To start us off in March, on the 5th we will present "Where There is Love" arranged by Douglas Nolan with words and music by Karen Crane. It seems like the theme of 'light' seems to come up in almost every anthem I have been choosing. In this instance, we sing "Where there is love, the path is clear. Oh, let the light of love live in me." We are given a message of all that happens when love exists.

On March I19th, we look more to the season of Lent as we sing a very effective arrangement of the familiar "Lonesome Valley." Jesus surely knew what He would be facing and felt that He had so much more the disciples needed to know to continue ministering to His followers. He was also being abandoned in a way, so the idea of a 'lonesome' valley is very suitable. The arrangement by Gilbert Martin creates almost a haunting effect by layering the voices and creating moments if dissonance in the process.

Please start to make plans to participate in as many of the services that we offer as you can. The more we can turn our attention to the lessons of the Lenten season the richer our experiences will be.

ORGAN LETTER FROM HAMILTON

Dear Friends in Christ,

January 16, 2023

It is a pleasure for me to write in support of the organ improvement project at Our Savior's. I write this from the perspective of having used the instrument in my younger years as well as having been invited back to play worship services, weddings, funerals, and as part of the Organs in Revue summer recital series. Since graduating from high school, I earned my Bachelor of Music degree in organ performance, my Master of Sacred Music degree with a concentration in organ, and my Doctor of Musical Arts degree in organ performance and literature. I am eternally grateful to the solid foundation in music I received while growing up in Hibbing and most especially the opportunities I had at Our Savior's. Hearing hymns led by Norma Brandt with gusto and singing in choirs under Marilyn Ellefson, Clyde Hill, and Jan Peterson helped shape me into the well-rounded church musician I am. I currently serve as Minister of Music at St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Duluth where I plan and

lead worship with the organ and piano and direct the choirs. Every Sunday's work is the result of the solid foundation I received in music and nurturing in the Lutheran faith growing up at OSLC.

The primary function of any church organ is to lead God's gathered people in song. There is popular rhetoric around that says people who play the organ are becoming more and more rare is largely popular rhetoric. I presently have eight organ students ranging in age from 14 to 70, and most of them serve the church in some fashion. Churches who treat their musicians well have no problem finding folks to lead the music in them. Churches who care enough to ensure the church organ is in top working order also have no trouble finding musicians to serve. Because of this, the organ remains the best choice for leading congregational song because it creates a large amount of sound with one person in control. A symphony could also lead a large group, but what church can afford that?

The organ at Our Savior's has a wonderful heritage. Having been designed, built and installed when the church was built in the 1950s, it is showing signs of age. Parts wear out; leather gets stiff; electrical connections get dirty. While it's true that there are organs in Europe that have survived for centuries, even they have required regular maintenance along with an occasional renewal project in order to keep the organ sounding. Such is the state of the organ at OSLC. Great strides have been made in organ mechanics and technology in the last seventy years. The organ would benefit from such updates.

Improvements in the organ's voicing would also make the instrument more usable in worship. The organ was designed for a room that had much more reverberation than the present circumstances at Our Savior's. I can remember when I first started playing, there was reverberation in the church which is now gone due to the installation of carpet and pew cushions. This makes it difficult for the worshiper to sing because it is impossible to hear others singing. The various sounds on the organ need attention in order to speak best in this different acoustical environment than it was when the organ was originally designed.

I strongly recommend the congregation approve this project. The organ has served you well for 70+ years. Doing this work now will make it certain to continue in service for another 70 years and beyond. If you have questions, I welcome further conversation.
