A NOTE FROM PASTOR BRIAN BIRK

COUNCIL MEETING NOTE TUESDAY, JULY 11TH

Dear Congregation,

Over the last couple of months, the council has been struggling with this year's spending plan vs this year's expenses. As of June 31st, we are \$20,898 in the negative.



We started the year in January \$9,500 in the red, carrying the 2022 debt into 2023.

We also had some considerable amount of double salary payments, including the training of two office support staff. We also were not immune to the inflation costs that everyone has felt. We also had a few office repairs to our copier.

The roof project exposed an electrical wiring issue that needed to be fixed, but again the cost of this repair was substantial.

Here are a couple things we are looking at, hopefully they will help lessen the future burdens.

First, we asked Cindy, with her guidance to withhold Synod Benevolence payments until the congregation's budget is stable. Our giving to them monthly is about \$2,000.

In the office, we are looking at the number of phones and data plans for internet service. Also, we are exploring a service contract for the copier, as stated above we had some significant repair bills for the copier lately.

Barring any staff changes we should not have any extra staff salaries.

Right now, the council could use your prayers and ideas for cost savings.

We have included an envelope with this month's newsletter, not only are we hoping some people will be able to help financially, but we would love to receive your ideas.

INTRODUCTION TO THE ORGAN

Installment IV: Types of Action



The connection between the key and the pipe valve, called the "action" of the organ, can be achieved by mechanical or electrical means. In a mechanical action instrument long rods or "trackers" pull down the valves under the pipes. covered, all organs used trackers to connect the keys to the pipes. Today, many builders make mechanical action instruments. Obviously, the keyboards must be close to the pipe valves or

the action may be hard to play. Usually, the keyboards and pipes are all built in a case with the pipes directly above and in front of the player. The best thing about mechanical action is that the player can feel the opening of the pipe valves and can make different kinds of attacks and releases by pressing and releasing the key slowly or quickly. Until electricity was discovered, all organs used trackers to connect the keys to the pipes. Today, many builders make mechanical action instruments.

PASTA FEED FOR BENEFITING PROJECT CARE

September 19 and 20. Hibbing Memorial Building

This group of dedicated medical volunteers conducts free medical clinics twice a week in Hibbing and also has clinics in three other Iron Range cities. Their mission is to serve those who are under or non-insured giving help with blood pressure check ups, diabetes check, vaccinations and minor aliments.



It has been three years since our group of area ELCA churches have held this event due to Covid interfering for two years. The dates are September 19 for prep work and 20th for serving. We do take outs and eat in and for noon time we also deliver to local businesses, school and the mines. We serve 11:30-1:00 and again 4:30-7:00 usually for dine in and take out. Since we are doing this at the Memorial Building we will also offering drive by for take outs. I have discussed with the PC director the possibility of have a raffle/silent auction they would be responsible for running.

The menu is a pasta in red sauce with meat, coleslaw, a cookie, a couple slices Italian bread with butter pats and we also provide small packets of parmesan cheese. We are hoping to solicit cabbage heads for local gardeners as well as carrots. We will try to buy locally made pasta. Whether we bake or buy cookies is still being decided.

We plan to make the sauce ahead of time and freeze to help with prep time. Pasta is usually partially cooked the day before and finished day of event.

I am contacting area churches again to participate in this worthy event. Some of us have discussed have the Ministerial group of Hibbing taking this on as an annual event as our churches are taught to help those less fortunate than we are whether it is with food, shelter, medical help and mostly certainly remembering all in prayer.
